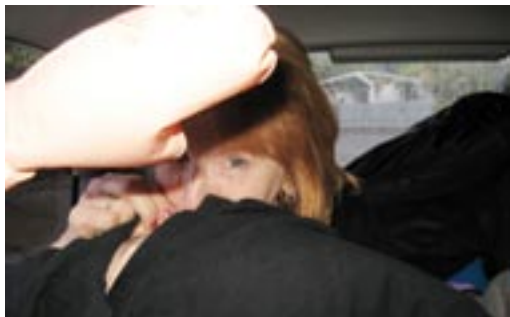

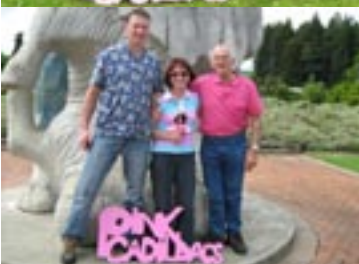

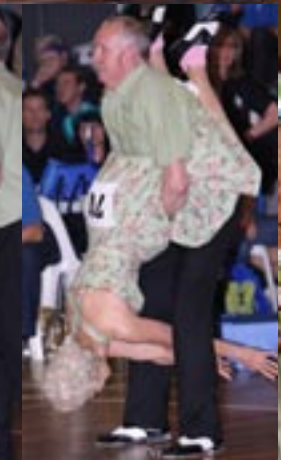
Our trip home was good, we had two yummy food stops at places Sue had found on other trips. It was nice to get back to quiet Wanganui and home, family and animals.

 - How many stars am I worth? (10 pts)

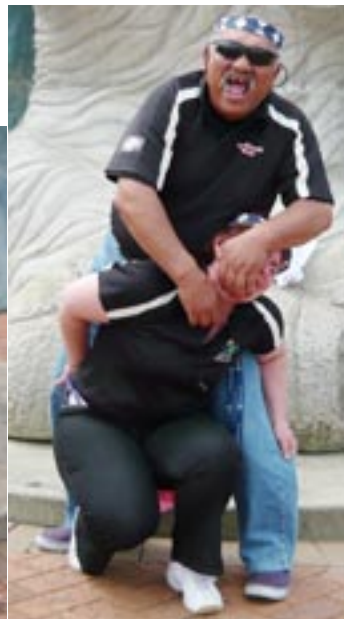
